The opportunities for us grow each year and the impact we have on our community has a wider reach each day. Nothing brings me more joy as a pastor than when we take risks together for the sake of the gospel in our world..

As we celebrate the birth of Christ this Christmas, I am full of joy and gratitude for YOU and for the people and things at Calvary that help me remember that Christ is a bright Light shining Love and Hope into our world. In 2019, for me those were:

• Spiritual practices and programs that IN-vite me to remember that I am beloved and worthy just as I am - such as small groups like ROOTED and Tuesday Prayer & Study Group that validate my 'being' and not my 'doing'; services like Healing & Wholeness that help me know that the God I worship is not a God who wants me to produce more, but

rather to seek health and wholeness of body, mind, and soul; and volunteering at Calvary's booth during PRIDE fest which reminds me that my humanity is directly tied to how I value other people's humanity.

- The beauty and grandeur of our sacred worship spaces that IN-spire me to remember that God is God and I am not such as the melodies and harmonies of music, the creativity of art, the community of worship, the power of prayer, the gifts of grace in communion, the bread and the cup.
- Ministries that IN-volve me in the work of God's kin-dom in the world like reading at Stedman Elementary with 3rd graders; building relationships and advocating for racial justice with New Hope Baptist; and listening to someone in need who walks through our doors and needs help with a bus pass and some food.
- Opportunities such as our fall stewardship campaign and the Hymnal Dedications and the Warming Ways of Winter Family Promise Auction and the Youth Hymn Sing Fundraiser and The Giving Tree, all of which give Damon and me the chance to IN-vest in the work of God so that we can put our money where our mouth is which allows us to grow spiritually as we focus first on the work of God in the world through Calvary, and secondarily on providing for our own needs (those always seem to get taken care of!)


#### A Note to Calvary

### Sabbath Curriculum


Sabbath can be an abstract concept to think about. For some, the closest practice of sabbath we get to is vacation. And while sabbath is not vacation it may be a helpful connection to what helps us rest, to be in a space of breath from work, daily/weekly tasks, and the hustle of schedules. If sabbath is a concept you speak of only at church or perhaps even try to practice from time to time but have not found a regular engagement with a practice this study is for you.

Pastors Anne and Morgan have designed this study to meet you wherever you are in your experience of a sabbath practice and hope that this study can help all of us explore how sabbath can help us examine and discern our communal and individual practices of sabbath. This study can be done on your own, with family, in a small group, or in your church school class. We invite all of you at Calvary to join us in the study during the weeks of January 13-March 2.

Following the study sessions we invite you to join us for

our Lenten Suppers: March 11, 18, 25, and April 1, where we will explore what keeps us from being able to live out or live into a sabbath practice. As we explore these barriers or conflicts to sabbath practices we will also see how we as a community can support each other in moving through these barriers to a place that is more free to live out these practices.

We will then explore in our committees, GPS groups, ministry teams, church school classes, at large church events how we can implement sabbath practices together. Supporting both our individual and communal practices of this core biblical teaching. We will celebrate this collective process with a church-wide meal in May (exact date to be determined).

### Middle Adult Ministry?

A US NEWS AND WORLD REPORT magazine from some years back questioned the wisdom of the usual labels used to define aging Americans. Given the increased good health and vitality of folks over 55 years of age, it was determined that it is not captivating, encouraging or motivating to refer to the 55 year old plus demographic as SENIORS. In fact the article calls adults 50 to 70 years of age middle adults. Americans over 50 are living healthier, more active, more productive and longer lives. A person 50 or 60 can expect to live 30 plus more years.


This changing demographic landscape has abundant implications for the church. There is a great deal of wisdom, financial security, discretionary time and experience within the population that is newly and actively retired. Ministry opportunities await.

Calvary has a treasure trove of Middle Adults or whatever label you choose to use, who are actively engaged in this community of faith and who are deeply committed to opportunities for growth, fellowship and service. There are Church School classes, Bible Studies, GPS Groups, Choir, volunteer possibilities of Bootstraps and Blessings and Family Promise or Church School Teaching, Youth Group Advising - all of which cross many age groupings. In many ways the traditional approach to Senior Ministries in church life has dramatically changed. There are still, however, needs not yet explored or met.

As we age we are motivated by five values:

- 1) Autonomy the desire to be or remain self-sufficient and well.
- 2) Social and spiritual connectedness we respond more to people than programs.
- 3) Service A desire to give something back to community and world.
- 4) Growth A desire to continue to grow and learn.
- 5) Vital Living Activities that bring fresh and new experiences and perspectives.

The purpose of this article is to spark your imagination (if you are a middle adult or older) to give thought to added opportunities to meet the above five values in our life together here at Calvary. Watch for a gathering opportunity in January for strategic brain storming for Calvary's many Middle and Middle Plus Adults.



### Lent at Calvary: A Journey of Sabbath Moments

Creating intentionality around keeping sabbath is an essential component of our life of faith, and yet, for so many of us – it is the last thing we give attention to because we're so busy or we think it won't fit into our way of life. Through our church-wide curriculum, we will study the biblical and theological roots of Sabbath in January and February. We will continue the journey of sabbath discernment this Lent by exploring what sabbath means for our individual lives and for our life together as a community of faith. For most of us sabbath may not come in large blocked off periods of time and/or in taking a whole day off at a time to rest or renew. Rather, sabbath might just be about finding moments - moments where we can just be, breathe, re-center, and re-focus. These sabbath moments are about reminding ourselves that we are beloved children of God just as we are, and they're about releasing the responsibility of "producing" and earning" and/or responding to the needs and desires of others. And over time, all these sabbath moments can and will create meaningful change in our lives.

## Calvary Ministry Stories: What is Kentucky Circle Village!

My latest assignment from Pastor Alice was to visit Kentucky Circle Village, one of Calvary's longtime mission partners. Called a "unique housing experiment for the independent aging" when it was conceived in the late 1950's, Kentucky Circle Village will celebrate 60 years of serving Denver seniors since it opened in 1959. Rents were \$30 per month for a dormitory room, \$42.50 for an efficiency apartment, \$62.50 for a one bedroom apartment, and \$75 for a two bedroom apartment.

Envisioned in 1951 by Raymond Waser, a pastor at First Plymouth Church, Kentucky Circle Village, or KCV, was to be a home for elderly people who were able to care for themselves but did not wish to live alone. And at that time as now, being able to live independently relied solely upon retirement savings and social security. The mission remains to provide affordable independent living to seniors in a community of caring and fellowship.

Three downtown churches came together to build the Village: First Plymouth Congregational Church, First Baptist church (Calvary Baptist now) and United Presbyterian Church (which became Green Mountain Presbyterian). The whole concept was controversial when first introduced resulting in editorials, delays in approval, and neighborhood concerns but it was finally approved. The original value of the land was \$778 in 1958 when the permits were issued. The land is now worth more than \$8 million.

Since then, the three churches have formed a non-profit called Senior Homes of Colorado Foundation. In 2016, they partnered with Midwest Housing Equity Group (a low income housing tax credit investment group) so the facility could be renovated.

Designed by Modernist architect Eugene Sternberg, KCV was innovative in its design, retaining the natural grade and orientation for encouraging community yet preserving privacy and nature. Even the streets are curved which reduces traffic speed and the buildings' eaves jut out giving the illusion of more space.

Consisting of 29 buildings on 8.5 acres, KCV has 172 total apartments and is 98% occupied. There is currently a waiting list of 193 seniors. Rent now starts at \$425 for a studio with \$875 at the high end for a two bedroom apartment. That cost covers electricity, natural gas, water, sewer

and trash collection. Amenities include laundry rooms, an on-site beauty salon, reserved parking, a computer room and noontime meal service available Sunday through Thursday. There are also daily activities which include sing-alongs, educational presentations, themed parties, games, movies and more.

To live at KVC, one must be 62 years or older, making less than \$37,801 per year (\$43,200 per couple), complete an income certification annually and agree to an annual apartment inspection.


Calvary Baptist Church has remained committed to the concept with Bruce Whitaker currently serving as President of the Board of Directors after Gary Diffendaffer and Walter Rowell both served as Presidents in the past. Jim Comstock has just joined the Board and Caroline Weese, a former Calvary member, served on the Board for years.

According to Julie Hoebel, the Executive Director, the biggest challenge now is how to help residents age in place. One recent addition to help meet that goal was the hiring of a Care Manager, a Licensed Social Worker, whose first year salary was funded by First Plymouth. She is there to help ensure the residents live fuller safer lives while aging in place. Another need area is volunteers who could be part of the Emergency Team who would respond to the Village's needs when there is a power outage, storm, or other catastrophe. KCV also needs drivers and special small project helpers.

As I was getting ready to leave KCV, I looked through their original scrapbook which depicted the process to get the Village built and later the finished project. In the 1960's, residents were photographed in groups according to their home state and of the 176 living there, 23 were born abroad and immigrated to Colorado. KCV was and is indeed a great experiment that has truly succeeded in its mission.

myriad of ways. As we've seen time and time again with the Israelite people in the Narrative Lectionary this fall, God is "All IN!" with us, even when we fall short of being "All IN!" with God. The heart of the good news is this: God always shows up. God is always with us. God never gives up on us. No matter who we are or where we are on life's journey. I love that about God. And I love that our church embraces whoever joins us to take the journey together.

Remember the story of Elijah and the prophets of Baal that we studied this fall? "Who, indeed, is God?" (1 Kings 18:39) the people ask? The One True God is not an idol because an idol can't be in relationship with us. The One True God is a living, breathing person - Jesus Christ, the giver of life and the giver of the gifts of forgiveness and grace, the One who unites us as a communion of saints - past, present, and future. The One True God is the One who releases us from bondage: who leads us, frees us, saves us, delivers us the God who brings us Life. The One who is the Word Made Flesh, the Light of the World, Emmanuel - God with us.

Just like the people on Mount Carmel that day in 1 Kings 18, yes, there will be times where we are dismissive of God because of our pride and ego and yes, there will be times when we are distracted from God by competing priorities. But in the end, like the faithful saints who have gone before us that have built and sustained the church we enjoy today, will we remain faithful and loyal and to the

#### Bible Stories we have focused on this Fall:

Isaac and Sarah: They had to wait a very, VERY long time to get what they wanted. This Bible story is about patience, and allowing God to decide when the time is right for certain things in our lives. The class played "wait and go" (red light, green light), and made baby Isaac cupcakes for a snack.

**Jacob Wrestles God:** A tough story. A struggling man who was put in his place by God to figure things in his life out and finally began thinking of everything

he was blessed with. The kids played "Jacob BINGO" and made an acrostic of their blessings.

Moses and God's name, The Burning Bush: God got Moses' attention with the burning bush. God helped Moses to deliver a message. God is always here speaking to us, we need to listen. The children made a burning bush snack out of cheese, grapes, and pretzels. They made paintings of the burning bush.

**Hear O Israel:** The children learned about the Ten Commandments, even tried guessing them through Charades. They decorated bookmarks of the Ten Commandments to keep in their Bibles.

**Ruth:** God was faithful to Ruth and Naomi, and was with them when they didn't even know it, just like God is always with us. The kids made "bundles of grain" snacks with pretzel sticks and twizzlers. They had to find missing words from the scripture around the room to see if they were paying attention to the story.

**David Anointed King:** The big focus was the ark of the covenant. He brought the Ark of the Covenant to Jerusalem. They made an ark using rice krispies, pretzel sticks and candy corn to eat. They also played a game of bringing a cotton ball across the room on a paper plate, on their heads, or while spinning to see how hard it could have been to deliver the Ark.

James and John ask a favor of Jesus: This lesson taught the children what it takes to be a servant of the Lord. They served each other snacks and laid down to listen to music. Elijah at Mount Carmel: People were believing in the wrong God. It was up to Elijah to show who those people that our God is the only God, and helped them to believe. They created the scene of Elijah at the mount out of craft supplies.

The Little Children and Jesus: Jesus showed the disciples and children that he always has time for them. We can always trust in him, for he is forever in our hearts. Each child had their height tagged on the wall to let them know that God will always love them no matter how tall they are. They ate fruit kabobs, and decorated cardboard hearts.

Isaiah's Vineyard Song: God's Peace and Love is with us, even when it is hard to see. The class made grapes out of paper and created a vineyard along the wall with finger paint.

Josiah's Reform: God is pleased when a person hears God's word and responds with a humble and obedient heart. They played "following God's Path" and created scrolls out of pretzel rods and fruit roll-ups.

**Advent:** They discussed the meaning of Advent. The candles, symbols in the Sanctuary, creating their own Advent wreaths out of construction paper. They went over the Story of Christmas, the birth of Jesus and created stained glass silhouettes.

Her significant ministry at Calvary included the founding of ElderCare, day care for the frail elderly and respite for their family care givers.
