

Gospel Reading

Mark 12:28-44

²⁸ One of the scribes came near and heard them disputing with one another, and seeing that he answered them well, he asked him, "Which commandment is the first of all?" ²⁹ Jesus answered, "The first is, 'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; ³⁰ you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' ³¹ The second is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these." ³² Then the scribe said to him, "You are right, Teacher; you have truly said that 'he is one, and besides him there is no other'; ³³ and 'to love him with all the heart, and with all the understanding, and with all the strength,' and 'to love one's neighbor as oneself,'—this is much more important than all whole burnt offerings and sacrifices." ³⁴ When Jesus saw that he answered wisely, he said to him, "You are not far from the kingdom of God." After that no one dared to ask him any question.

³⁵ While Jesus was teaching in the temple, he said, "How can the scribes say that the Messiah is the son of David? ³⁶ David himself, by the Holy Spirit, declared,

'The Lord said to my Lord,

"Sit at my right hand,

until I put your enemies under your feet."

- ³⁷ David himself calls him Lord; so how can he be his son?" And the large crowd was listening to him with delight.
- ³⁸ As he taught, he said, "Beware of the scribes, who like to walk around in long robes, and to be greeted with respect in the marketplaces, ³⁹ and to have the best seats in the synagogues and places of honor at banquets! ⁴⁰ They devour widows' houses and for the sake of appearance say long prayers. They will receive the greater condemnation."
- ⁴¹ He sat down opposite the treasury, and watched the crowd putting money into the treasury. Many rich people put in large sums. ⁴² A poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which are worth a penny. ⁴³ Then he called his disciples and said to them, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury. ⁴⁴ For all of them have contributed out of their abundance; but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on.

Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. Lent comes from the Anglo-Saxon word Lenten, which means "spring." The forty days represents the time Jesus spent in the wilderness,

enduring temptation and preparing to begin his ministry. Lent is a time of repentance, self-reflection, and preparation for the coming of Easter. In the early church, Lent was a time to prepare new converts for baptism. Today, Christians focus on their relationship with God, often choosing to give up something or to volunteer and give of themselves for others. Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter" and the reverent spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful anticipation of the Resurrection.

The **prelude** and **postlude** are based on the same hymn-tune, LIEBSTER JESU, found in many Christian hymnals. Karg-Elert (1877-1933) employs chromaticism, and presents the tune in canon (a round) between the tenor and bass voices. Bach (1685-1750) writes out the tune in a straightforward manner, tune in the soprano, with a simple harmonization.

The Moment of Gratitude is written by Marlys Marshall. Marlys and her husband Bill joined Calvary on the last Sunday Rev. Larry Loughhead was here in 1992. They have 5 Children +3 spouses, 5 grandchildren +2 spouses, and 2 1/3 great grandchildren. Marlys is the volunteer coordinator in church office, was enrollment secretary before computers and the church clerk. She enjoys bowling, reading, watching movies, crossword and jigsaw puzzles.

Today's **soloist is Anne Comstock**, Anne and her husband, Jim, joined Calvary in 2000. She is blessed daily by the Calvary community and has served in many diverse ways from music to nursery! Anne has worked in the child welfare field for 30 years and especially enjoys her role of grandma to five amazing grandkids.

The Gospel Reading is read by Susan Wirt. Susan has been a member of Calvary since 1986. Susan serves on the Stewardship Committee, volunteers with Family Promise, reads with third graders at Stedman Elementary as part of the Calvary/New Hope partnership, and participates in Monday Pub and the Calvary book group. Susan is retired and enjoys hiking, reading, traveling, and going to movies and the theater.

The Scripture for today comes from Year 2 (Mark) of the Narrative Lectionary (NL), a four-year cycle of readings for use in worship that provide an overview of the biblical story by focusing on a different gospel and different Old and New Testament texts each year. The NL follows the program year—Sept. to May—and is shaped by the church calendar:

- Old Testament: From Labor Day through Advent, Old Testament readings move through the story of God's interactions with Israel and culminate in Advent with the prophets' longing and hope for the coming Messiah.
- Gospel: From Christmas to Easter, readings from one Gospel tell the story of the birth of the Messiah at Christmas, the revelation of the Messiah during Epiphany, and Jesus' passion through Lent and Holy Week.
- Early Church: From Easter Sunday through the Day of Pentecost, readings from the Gospels, Acts, and Paul's letters reveal the power of the Holy Spirit in the early church's story.
- Summer Readings from the Sunday after Pentecost through the summer are flexible and include different miniseries on books of the bibles or topics such as The Ten Commandments or the Lord's Prayer, etc.

The **Sung Response to Scripture** (which we will sing throughout the season of Lent) comes from our hymnal, Celebrating Grace, and is based on the hymn tune, MOON.

Today's **worship video** was compiled by **Damon Scalfaro.** Sermons are usually uploaded to Calvary's Facebook page, YouTube page, and website within 24 hours following worship.


