We are beginning a new story emphasis in Calvary communications, telling the stories of our congregants, what happens in our ministries, and new developments in our community. This story is the first in this new emphasis.

Content warning: racially motivated murder, lynching

Calvary's invitation to explore the complexities of life, injustice, and how healing can take place has been a foundation for significant learning about history to take place recently in Calvary small groups.

At Monday Night Pub in September, Becky Whitaker gave a presentation on her experience learning about racism in American history, as well as her experience with Soul2Soul Sisters, a Blackwomen-led, faith-based response to anti-Black violence in America. As Becky shared there were other points of connection to Calvary's ethos of



Becky noted her learnings about racism in history started a few years ago with a fellow church member.

Pastor Morgan led a Civil Rights road trip for the youth group and Denise Wylde served as a chaperone in 2018. Inspired by

Seeing all these sites sparked a mission in Becky to uncover and learn more about history that she never knew about.

A few stories that stood out during Becky's intentional learning include: Bruce (Becky's husband) has an ancestor who "owned a theatre in Kentucky, and there was a billiard room on the side of it that was only for blacks. And a white man started playing pool in that area, and an altercation occurred, and the white man was shot. And then a white mob came and strung up the black man in the theatre, and people could purchase tickets to take a shot at him."

Georgia and Alabama and saw a lot of those sites, [that Last summer Becky and her sister went back to Tulsa and were also seen on the youth trip]" Becky said. visited the Greenwood neighborhood in Tulsa and saw Montgomery, AL was particularly impactful with the hundreds of plaques where businesses had once stood. with a man whose family's bakery had burned down - even in times of doubt, despair, or disobedience. in the massacre. His family had never spoken of the painful history, but it was his mission to share it with others."

Becky was also in a family book club during the pandemic and read a lot of different books with her sister and nieces and nephews. Their discussions involved family and Oklahoma history, including their grandmother's teaching at an Indian school and the experiences of the Osage Indians depicted in the upcoming movie Killers of the Flower Moon. Becky's niece recommended a daily email called Anti-Racism the nonprofit organization Zinn Daily and Educational Project just to keep her thinking and learning new perspectives.

Becky soon realized that racism was present in all of this hidden history, and could be found in almost any area of her life.

After reading the book Killers of the Flower Moon with Calvary's Book Club, on Becky's trip to Oklahoma, she also visited Pawnee in the Osage Nation, where the movie was filmed. The Osage Indians had moved to a reservation that sat on some of the richest oil deposits in the United States. White "guardians" were required by law and appointed to manage each Osage person who possessed money from oil. Lots of criminal activity occurred including stealing money and murder. Murders of the Osage peoples followed in a "reign of terror" from 1921-1926. (To learn more, read Killers of the Flower Moon: The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI, by David Grann.)

"I continue to look at things in a new light, and I keep learning, because I don't want history to be hidden," Becky said.

The day prior to Becky's presentation at Pub, Hank Wyeno (pictured above right) came to speak at Calvary. His parents were incarcerated at Camp


What is the Spirit of **Curiosity?**



Amache in Granada, CO, just one of many Japanese internment camps that were opened from 1942-1945. More than 125,000 individuals of Japanese ancestry were held at these detention sites, and over two-thirds of those imprisoned were U.S. citizens.

When they were relocated to these camps, families could only bring with them what they could carry. (Pictured above is the poster with deportation instructions.) They had to leave behind houses, businesses, pets, and suffered tremendous financial losses.

John Anduri remembers Hank's presentation, unforgettable hour, where Hank shocked and awed us in the Calvary Chapel, recounting how over 120,000 Japanese and Japanese-Americans were forced from their homes to live from 1942-45 in concentration camps in Amache, Colorado and on the West Coast. As he bore witness to this dark chapter in our history, I recalled that my grandfather in Sacramento, appalled by this racist crime, had quietly paid the mortgage and taxes on his imprisoned Japanese-American neighbors' house, so they would have a home to return to."

In a similar vein, Monday Night Pub has hosted Eric Cahn, a survivor of the Holocaust who shared his experience of family

members shipped off to concentration camps, while Eric sheltered in France. David Peterson shared: "Hearing the personal account of being a 4-year old boy hidden in the basement of kind strangers for several years, reuniting with his younger sister who was hidden by other strangers, then eventually growing up in an orphanage in west Denver humanized the effects on the life for a child unlike any movie or other account I've ever seen or heard. It was bone-chilling to hear this first-hand account of the effects of one of the greatest tragedies in modern times on a real person sitting just feet away from me."

Often when this kind of history is shared, feelings arise such as shame, humiliation, or even anger that this is being discussed. But shame can be paralyzing and keep us stuck. Becky encourages us to move through the shame into learning.

"We should talk openly about it. There are so many similarities. We might not want to know our family history, but it's okay and important to talk about. There's stuff right in our backyard that we should know about," said Becky.


Right here in Colorado, there is so much to learn, and I (Pastor Alice) learned so much about our history here. Downtown at the intersection of 15th and Arapahoe is a plaque marking the location of the assassination of Captain Silas Soule (pictured).

Soule as a younger man worked as a "conductor" on the underground railroad, and as a Captain refused Major John Chivington's orders to massacre First Nation Peoples at Sand Creek. Major Chivington had lied, saying that the Arapahoe and Cheyenne Indians were planning an attack on U.S. settlers, and this would be a preemptive strike, when in fact Chivington's planned attack was a massacre on innocent Indians. Chivington went through with the attack and one hundred and fifty First Nation Peoples were murdered on November 29, 1864. Afterwards, Soule also wrote letters to members of Congress telling the truth of that terrible day and encouraged others to do the same, prompting an investigation and ruining Major Chivington's political aspirations. Soule was assassinated on April 23, 1865.

There is the story of Preston Porter - the 15-year-old who was falsely accused of murder and rape in 1900. He was held in jail in Denver, and taken to Limon where Porter was burned alive. The historical marker was placed in 2020 near the location of Denver's Old City Hall, by the intersection of Larimer and Speer.

There is also the story of the Chinese community in Denver in the 1870's. Anti-Chinese sentiments were building, and a "bloody riot" occurred that destroyed all of Chinatown's businesses. It never recovered. The Chinese Exclusion Act was passed in 1882 which banned Chinese immigration and made immigrants ineligible for citizenship. That act was finally repealed in 1943.

It even becomes close as Calvary Baptist. When Calvary moved from Ogden and 24th to 16th and Downing, the move was motivated by white flight. On page 21-22 of our history book by Kathy Smiley, it reads: "Although the Calvary congregation was, by all accounts, loving and accepting Christians, as products of their times, some watched with discomfort as the neighborhood that had once been 'populated by desirable families' – desirable being synonymous with 'white' – became the home to a large black Baptist population." This is also mentioned in a Denver Five Points neighborhood history book that Becky showed at the presentation.

Despite the difficult subject matter, Becky's presentation was tremendously meaningful.

Nancy Hoffmaster said she "was grateful for Becky's personal story as she has searched to overcome early examples of racism in her hometown of Tulsa. Her comments opened the way for all of us to share our stories of horrendous memories of harsh racism that seemed "natural" at the time — many in the 1940s, 50s and beyond. It was an eye-opening hour of shame, but also of hope."


Lynda Pelton shared: "I appreciated the Pub discussions after her presentation and how we all can learn from each other's experiences. Hopefully we will continue to have these learning opportunities."

Becky gave Monday Night Pub participants some questions to think about, such as what history in their community is new to them or uncomfortable? Or if they knew someone who took a stand even though it was uncomfortable at the time? Becky suggests places like ancestry.com and the very handy tool of Googling to learn more about our own history.

History can be very painful to learn about. We wish we didn't know, or wish it didn't happen, or perhaps wish we didn't feel such emotions as shame or anger. But education is crucial in not repeating our history and healing racial wounds.

Becky says, "it is important to know our history as a family, church, community, and nation—the good, the bad and the ugly—to discuss it openly and honestly, and use it to do better in the present and future."
