


Updating the Church's Crismons - October 22 @ 9 a.m. - 12 p.m. - Boardroom.



Evergreen Annual Gathering Recap

Last Friday and Saturday, I had the pleasure of attending my first Annual Gathering with the Evergreen Association. Evergreen is our regional affiliation within American Baptists. Since this was Calvary's first year with Evergreen, I saw everything with new eyes. Despite being a stranger to many people there, I felt welcomed warmly into the Evergreen family.

One highlight was participating in an ethnic caucus and the consensus model for the first time which are the two main structures of Evergreen decision making. There are four ethnic caucuses within Evergreen: black, hispanic, asian, and euro. I went to the Euro Caucus. In our caucuses, we reviewed the budget, clarified any budget questions with Rev. Doug, and talked about where we saw God in our places of ministry.

In our caucuses we engaged the consensus model. On each matter on the agenda, we had to demonstrate our support or disagreement. If we hold up one finger, we agree completely. If we hold up two fingers, we can see pluses and minuses but don't want to block the issue. If we hold up three fingers, we strongly disagree and can't support. In those spaces where we disagree with a motion or issue, Rev. Doug asked us to dig deeper. If we do disagree, we have to voice why. "The spirit engages in our 'why' space," said Rev. Doug.

In any decision we made, Rev. Doug encouraged us to think about: "where is the justice in this, where is the love in this, and what is best for our entire community. Not what you want but what is best for the family," he said.

A significant part of the consensus model is taking the time for dissenting voices to be heard. "It is just as important to create space for those who disagree to voice their concerns," said Rev. Doug. Efficiency is not a priority, but relationship and equality are. "We need you heard, because without you heard, we cannot make a choice," Rev. Doug said.





Good News

lan and Morgan Fletcher celebrated their 5th wedding anniversary on Thursday, October 5th. They are so grateful to have shared these 5 years of learning, becoming parents - in a pandemic - and a move with Calvary as a key part of our community!

Angelique Watts joined the Calvary congregation on October 15! We are grateful to have Angelique find her church home at Calvary. Look for a new member profile on Angelique next week.

Then we all returned to the main room, and all four caucuses went through the budget and our respective questions together. Each caucus had an appointed representative to report on our respective discussions, and then another member from another caucus prayed for that group. I really got to see how the caucus model distributes power evenly and allows all voices to be heard.

Another highlight of the conference was the workshops. I attended one on Reparations. I also attended one on Calvary's partnership with New Hope Baptist, led by Rev. Dr. Eugene Downing and Rev. Anne J. Scalfaro. In both workshops, we got into small groups and discussed different questions. In the Reparations workshop, we discussed any examples where we felt we were treated differently because of our race, and what action-based steps we could take for reparations. It was a breath of fresh air to be able to talk about race dynamics in a ministry setting.

In the workshop on Calvary and New Hope, we discussed what barriers we face personally in the work towards racial reconciliation. Euro participants mentioned a fear of using the right words, not being in any friendships with people of color, or making a mistake. People of color mentioned letting go of bitterness, overcoming memory of traumatic experiences, and more. Overall, both workshops were tremendously meaningful with participants sharing in vulnerable ways.

Within the conference itself, I felt so very welcomed by everyone who attended. People sat down with me and started conversations. Calvary and its pastors were officially welcomed in both worship services with gifts. The conference ended and I had a warm feeling in my chest. It felt like I was truly home with a denomination.

Second Sermon in the six-week series: Chronos &

Kairos

Bathsheba's story invites us to name and grieve trauma, while dreaming within God's kairos time of justice and dignity for all beloveds. As is all too often the case, to hear HerStory within the pages of scripture, we must sift through the power and privilege of David's story which is driven solely by chronos time – his focus on self and how to gratify his desires in the next moment – no matter the cost. It is easy for us as individuals and for us as a church to follow society in how we view our calling and priorities. Yet the Gospel invites more from us.

This week we'll INVESTigate how God calls us to be stewards of HerStory so that we can proclaim the fullness of the Gospel Story. And like the parable that Nathan tells David, what at first might seem like a great cost, just might be our greatest calling. Sometimes it just takes one story – HerStory – to awaken us to our human failings and call us forward to God's redemptive future.
