Praise God from whom all blessings flow! Calvary – what a Spirit-filled weekend we shared together! Thank you for showing up in such great number for what was an extraordinary worship experience on Sunday. I was moved to see our congregation step outside of our comfort zone and join hands and hearts with our sisters and brothers at New Hope Baptist.

After talking together for a year about how our churches and our collective voices could be a witness for racial reconciliation and relationship building in Denver, Pastor Downing and I brought our congregations together for fellowship and discussion in November of 2016. And this past Sunday, March 10th, 2019 – 2.5 years later...after several more joint conversations, shared cultural experiences, a new partnership developing with Stedman Elementary School, and lots of good meals – we had our first worship experience together.

"I am almost without words as I write to say thank you for an amazing experience this past weekend. Eugene, New Hope is filled with folks whose light shines and whose passion for the Savior is evident. Anne, it is no different with Calvary! 


Throughout the year, the staff have been reading God, Improv, and the Art of Living by MaryAnn



Member Profile

Tom Moss turns 98 on St. Patrick's Day this year. He's the oldest Calvary member and also one who has led a most interesting life.

Born in 1921 in Spokane, Washington, Tom grew up in Baltimore and Washington DC, the only child of a church organist father and a piano loving mother. Even though Tom took piano for 5 years at the Peabody Institute, he doesn't play now but has retained a lifelong love of classical music. He met his wife, Margie, at their Baptist church while both were in their teens. Tom knew she was the one and gave her is High school class ring as a promise ring.

Tom was attending Johns Hopkins when he realized that war was coming so he and a friend enlisted as aviation cadets in the Air Force. He graduated as a 2nd Lieutenant from flight school in Blytheville, Arkansas in 1943 and married Margie the same day. They then traveled by rail to Oklahoma City where Tom underwent further training flying B29s and A20s.

The day a pilot gets to fly by himself is a big one and Tom was excited to take off in his A20. Tom was climbing towards the sky like a homesick angel when he heard the Squadron commander over his headset say "Pull up your wheels"- Tom had forgotten to retract his gear. Tom continued to enjoy his first solo flight but when he landed, he says the Captain went up one side and down the other of him for not pulling up his wheels. Tom then headed to the officers' club for a drink. And never forgot to retract them again.

Tom was a member of the 416th Light Bomb Group, a group of A20 pilots who were slated to head to Africa to meet the Desert Fox. When Rommel (a German military leader) caved, the group was disbanded and Tom was very disappointed. However, the military had other plans for Tom. He was sent to Roswell, NM, where he checked out as a B17 pilot in only 20 days. Tom and Margie then hopscotched across the country to various bases as part of the 461st Bombardment Group.

Finally assigned to Torretta in Italy off the Adriatic, Tom and his crew flew 51 combat missions for which Tom was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross. Back home, Tom turned down an offer to become a Captain saying "I'm going to stay in Charleston, NC as a live 2nd Lieutenant, not a dead Captain."

Tom remained in the Air Force as a flight instructor. He (and Margie) participated in the Berlin Air Lift in 1948, flying C54s loaded with 100 pound bags of coal to the American sector of the city for 6 months. Obviously, Margie did not normally fly with Tom but that onetime Tom took her up and let her fly a C47 over Hamburg Germany. Tom retired from the military in 1964.

For the next 18 years, Tom worked for United Airlines as a pilot and flight instructor here in Denver. Upon retiring, Margie and he enjoyed travelling in their 5th wheel and cruising around the world. Married for 63 years, Margie died in 2005 and Tom misses her greatly. They had three children, all girls born in different cities. They lost one daughter to cancer early.

Tom has a unique love of turquoise, which comes from his time working briefly as a travelling inside auditor for Fred Harvey, a chain of restaurants and hotels along railroad routes from Albuquerque to Los Angeles. Tom made friends with the buyer and had first choice of the jewelry. His collection of turquoise and silver includes a piece by Ben Nighthorse Campbell.

Asked about his love of flying, Tom responded "Pilots are like firemen, there's lots of boredom but when something goes wrong, you earn your money and save lives." Tom flew 60,000 hours in a variety of plane types-too many to count, he says.

Tom also believes in living life to its fullest and still is-living at the Eastern Star Retirement Home; enjoying happy hour and adventuring about Denver. His room is like a museum, reflecting his many interests (trains and planes) and life story. If you have the opportunity, spend some time with Tom. You'll enjoy a history lesson with humor from one of the last of the Greatest Generation.

Member Profile

John Anduri

With a career spanning religion, academia, journalism, and medicine, what hasn't John done? John grew up in Sacramento with eighteen relatives in church, and he moved to Colorado when he was 14. John is a graduate of Littleton High school, class of 1970. He went on to receive a bachelor's degree from CSU in Fort Collins and a Masters in Religious Studies from UChicago Divinity.

What you might not know is that John is a triple cancer survivor. He was diagnosed with Hodgkins lymphoma twice in his twenties. Six years ago he was diagnosed with colon cancer. Three years ago he had severe aortic stenosis, caused by radiation therapy from 1975, which required a heart valve replacement (with a cow valve no less). After his second round of cancer, he first worked as the editor of the newspaper in Fairplay, Colorado. Afterwards, he attended Iliff School of Theology and got a Masters of Divinity. From there he was a United Methodist Campus minister for five years at DU, taught humanities classes, coordinated experiential learning at DU, and served as a hospice chaplain.

In the early 90's, John was a pioneer creator of support groups and workshops for long-term cancer survivors and men with cancer. A feature on him in the Rocky Mountain News called "Soul Survivors" quotes John saying: "men stuff their feelings from Day One. We need to learn



how to deal with being vulnerable and scared to death, how to be held and cry when that's what we need." For the past thirty years, he has spoken at cancer survivor gatherings and conferences to help doctors and nurses better understand the range of challenges that patients and their families face.

Right after he finished chemotherapy in 1979, he moved in with a group of chiropractors who showed him how to heal his body holistically with proper diet and body

work. "Nowadays that sort of thing is mainstream, but back then, my doctor couldn't believe I was listening to these 'quacks' who said food is medicine." Treating his body well is a value. Dr. Harvey Potthoff, one of John's mentors, encouraged him to "be kind to the old person that you will be someday." One of the most healing "physicians" for John was a Lakota holy man, who invited him into his ancient healing practices.

That experience inspired John to give back to the Lakota Sioux community. He went and worked at the Todd Country Tribune on the Rosebud Reservation in South Dakota. Several years ago, he served on the board of CANA (Caring Assocation for Native Americans). In 2007 he was arrested for protesting Columbus Day, and spent a night in jail with Russell Means, one of the founders of the American Indian Movement.

John is also a very gifted writer. He wrote a memoir about his dad's Parkinson's Disease titled A Difficult Privilege. Writing the memoir was the "Damascus Road" for his future passion of creating support groups. His family's experience with their father's illness made John realize there was such a need. John launched a support group for adult children of parents with Parkinson's disease in 1988.

John keeps himself busy. John participates in the Reader's Theatre with the Academy of Lifelong Learning. He's taking Master Gardener training with Denver Ur-

to help him deal with the disease's aftermath. So he started his own.

ban Gardens. John serves on the board of directors for the Denver Health Community Health Centers. He helps lead a weekly Spanish-language support groups for Hispanic women with cancer. He spent a week in Washington D.C. lobbying for increased funding for community health centers.

After driving by Calvary for ten years, he went to a talk by spiritual director Jane Vennard here at Calvary. And the rest is history. He sees Calvary as a spiritual community garden, from Sunday worship in the morning, Taize services in the evening, and special services like Healing & Wholeness and Blessing of the Animals. He's also inspired by Calvary's work with Bootstraps & Blessings and Family Promise.

John has an older sister, Donna, and a younger brother, Myron. He loves being an uncle to four nephews, one niece, two great nephews, and two great-nieces. His great-nephew Maximus John Erik Anduri (pictured) is named after him.

"Life is a difficult privilege," John says. "As my great Aunt Lydia once advised, 'never forget, Johnny, life was never meant to be easy. And that's ok."
